

ABOUT PRIMEROS PASOS

Primeros Pasos is a non-profit organization founded in 2002 by Dr. Brent Savoie. The organization is currently managed by 8 Guatemalan women in charge of providing medical, dental, and nutritional health care through comprehensive programs developed and implemented to provide a better quality of life to the 10 rural communities of the Palajunoj Valley in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala.

Primeros Pasos originally began as a children's clinic with the mission to serve the students of the 10 primary schools in the Valley. However, the general population in the area remained without a good source of medical care. In 2005, with more funding and volunteers, Primeros Pasos began seeing patients at its facility, including out-of-school children and adults. On average, Primeros Pasos serves more than 4,500 patients a year, providing reliable and affordable medical, dental and nutritional services.

EL VALLE PALAJUNOJ

The Palajunoj Valley is inhabited by 25,000 people who consider themselves indigenous. It is one of the areas identified as having the highest levels of poverty and extreme poverty in the Quetzaltenango department. 95% of the inhabitants of the Palajunoj Valley are indigenous Mayan speakers of K'iche' and Mam. In some areas of the Valley, there are no good roads, no electricity, and access to potable water is very scarce. The communities also face many issues with the exploitation of natural resources by mining companies that extract materials from the mountains surrounding the Valley. Despite being 10 minutes from the Historic Center of Xela, the rural communities of the Palajunoj Valley remain without access to basic services and live in close vicinity of the municipal dump.

The effects of living in close proximity to the dump are evident in the Chuicaracoi community, which has been living on the land that serves as the municipal dump for the last 25 years. According to data from the Environmental Services office of the municipality, 240 tons garbage are collected daily by the sanitation service in the different urban areas of the municipality. For more than a decade, the garbage was left at the site untreated. occasionally set on fire, which released many toxic chemicals into the air.



The people of Chuicaracoj are constantly advocating to authorities to find another place to use as a garbage dump, because the bad odor and unhealthy environmental conditions cause gastrointestinal and respiratory illnesses to those living in the surrounding area.

DEAR FAMILY:

None of this would have been possible without the support of our volunteers, former volunteers, allies, members of our board of directors, but above all thanks to the trust of our beloved users.

I can only thank infinitely all the people who once again this year joined the noble cause of Primeros Pasos.

Angelica joined the Community Outreach project in 2022 with her daughter Ashly, who at the time was four months old and had a diagnosis of severe growth delays and low weight-for-age. At the end of the project, Ashly was one year and one month old with a healthy weight-for-age and moderate growth delays. Ashly will continue to receive treatment through the project in 2023 until she achieves a healthy nutritional status.





During 2022, Primeros Pasos continued to increase its efforts to provide accessible health and education services to the communities of the Palajunoj Valley of Quetzaltenango.

We remained committed to our mission of improving the quality of life in rural communities through low-cost preventative health care and health education. We are pleased to announce that in 2022, Primeros Pasos continued its success in delivering medical, dental and nutritional programs at our clinic, which remains the primary source of affordable and quality health care in the Valley.

The Community Outreach Program continued to make progress in reducing malnutrition and improving healthcare outcomes for Valley beneficiaries through preventative health education on hygiene, nutrition, and selfesteem, among other themes.

Our organization's involvement in improving the nutritional status of those in the Valley reflects our desire to improve health outcomes in a sustainable manner. We aim to improve the nutritional habits of mothers so that they can pass this information on to future generations and better equip their children and grandchildren to reach their full potential.

Through our Service Learning Program, Primeros Pasos also serves as a health education center for Guatemalan and foreign medical students, hosting medical students from the University of San Carlos CUNOC and visiting professional students from several foreign countries

Students learn valuable lessons about providing primary care in resource-limited settings, and the mix of students creates a unique environment for educational exchange. Primeros Pasos is committed to a culture of collaboration and empowerment, ensuring that our work is based on the participation of the local schools and communities we serve, our university partners, local government agencies, and other NGOs.





During the 2022 year, 1,392 patients were treated in the clinic. Of these patients, 48.35% were women, 24.78% men, 16.24% girls, and 10.63% boys. The community that received the most services was Llanos del Pinal, followed by Xecaracoj.

The most common diagnoses during the year were diabetes mellitus in adults and upper respiratory infections (URI) in children.

Twenty-five patients received wart freezing treatments, of which 75% had a full recovery after 3 or 4 sessions. These patients also received a combination of medication, topical cream application, and follow-up consultations.

In the area of reproductive health, 301 women received medical check-ups, prenatal care, family planning education, and access to contraceptive methods. A total of 67 PAP smears were performed, 100% with normal results.

Of the 37 patients who received PAP smears, 17 were free PAP smears conducted by our OB/GYN volunteer Dr.
Lucia Cazzato from Italy, in November 2022.

23 beneficiaries of the Community Outreach Program received free preventive and curative care through our Medical program.

SEBACEOUS CYST CASE IN COLLABORATION WITH DR. FRANCIA.

Our medical and dental teams had another successful collaboration to support the welfare of our clients! This time, it was for a patient diagnosed with a 3 mm sebaceous cyst located on the left side of the upper lip due to severe acne. Dr. Laura performed the intervention in the dental clinic, where she had access to the most adequate equipment and tools for the procedure. Dr. Francia assisted her throughout the whole process, and finished the procedure with a 2-stitch suture. Four months later the patient returned with a slightly larger cyst, so the same intervention was performed again.



At the end of the procedure, the patient was recommended to treat her acne with a dermatologist to prevent recurring issues.



During the 2022 year, 996 patients were served. Of these patients, 53% were women, 19% men, 14% girls, and 14% boys. The community that received the most services was Llanos del Pinal, followed by Xecaracoj. A total of 2,090 treatments were provided.

Recurrent patients who were satisfied with the service provided, returned to consult us again. We have also incorporated new patients who, through recommendations, are familiar with our services.





Our dental team is the best in the Valley, for which the Primeros Pasos family is very proud and congratulates especially our dear Dr. Francia who in this 2022 celebrated 8 years of work with the organization.

CONGRATULATIONS AND THANK YOU VERY MUCH



During the 2022 year patients were serverd.

Of the adults served, 81% of patients were women and 19% men. Of the children served, 57% were girls and 43% boys. The community that received the most services was Llanos del Pinal, followed by Xecaracoj.

The most common diagnoses during the year were OVERWEIGHT AND OBESITY in adults STUNTED GROWTH in children.

Stunting, also known as chronic malnutrition, is the condition in which children are much smaller in height than expected for their age. This condition affects children's overall development, health, and well-being. Children who experience stunting are at a higher risk for diseases and reduced productive capacity as adults.

Stunting has been a generational problem in the country and much of the adult population is of short stature. Due to this prevalence, many people consider it normal to be short, making the problem of stunting invisible. In conclusion, stunting is a real and important problem for thousands of Guatemalan children, which negatively affects both their present and future.



One of the most notorious problems within this issue is that the Ministry of Public Health and Social Assistance provides zinc supplements to children under 2 years of age to improve their height. However, they do not implement proper data tracking and follow-up procedures to ensure the zinc supplements are producing the desired effects.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROJECT

The Community Outreach Project focuses on addressing the nutritional needs of residents in the following communities of the Palajunoj Valley: Las Majadas, Bella Vista, Chuicavioc, Candelaria, Llanos del Pinal, Xecaracoj, Xepache, Chuicaracoj, Tierra Colorada Alta and Tierra Colorada Baja.

In order to choose the communities that need to be prioritized each year, the following aspects are taken into account: distance, specific needs of each community, and availability of the mothers to participate in the project activities.

The targeted intervention groups are: mothers of children under 5 years of age who have either low weight for age, moderate or severe acute malnutrition without complications, or are overweight or obese; and pregnant women. To identify those who qualified to enter the program, the project director Diana de Leon Soto visited each community, and traveled house to house informing mothers about the project and its benefits, as well as taking the weight and height of children under 5 years of age and pregnant women

In 2022, the project started with 179 beneficiaries: 86 mothers, 86 children under 5 years old, and 7 pregnant women. All beneficiaries were from the communities of LLanos del Pinal, Xecaracoj, Chuicavioc, Tierra Colorada Alta, Majadas, and Xepache. The predominant nutritional status of the 7 pregnant women was obese and overweight. However, by the end of the project, all women had successful labor and deliveries, and their nutritional status was under control.

Seventeen lectures were given to mothers in the five beneficiary communities on hygiene and food handling, malnutrition, its causes and consequences, personal hygiene, self-esteem and child stimulation, oral and dental hygiene, 12 essential vitamins and the cycle of domestic violence. There have been 1036 attendances by the beneficiary mothers.







MOBILE CLINICS

Two mobile clinics were held during the year targeting the most distant communities of the Palajunoj Valley.



August - Two mobile clinic days were held at the school in Tierra Colorada Baja, where medical and dental care were provided for all students of the school. The services provided free of charge included: preventative and curative check-ups, dental check-ups and extractions, application of fluoride, and the delivery of medication. Over 100 children between 4 and 12 years old benefited from these mobile clinics. This was possible thanks to Lotus Outreach, who in July provided us with a grant to continue running the community outreach project for a year.



Informative material was provided to beneficiary mothers regarding the importance of good nutrition and a video was made to share on all of our digital platforms. All this with the collaboration of our volunteer from lowa University Anne Scherrman.







through activities that allow them to learn firsthand the challenges that our communities face and the work that Primeros Pasos does to improve their quality of life. During 2022, we had a total of 23 volunteers visit us from Vanderbilt, Arizona, Chicago, Wisconsin, Manchester, and Cambridge Universities. The minimum commitment for volunteers is 4 weeks and we had several volunteers stay with us for up to 6 months. The activity schedule for our volunteers is Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 1:00 pm.

While we always look for ways our volunteers can develop in their field of expertise, it is also of vital importance for Primeros Pasos that our volunteers have a well-rounded experience by participating in other general activities including:

-Talks for mothers who are beneficiaries of the Community Outreach project. Volunteers support in the development of a topic to be taught to the groups and prepare related materials to be distributed.



-Workshops for beneficiary mothers of the Community Outreach project. Volunteers support the planning and execution of the workshops, including developing visual materials and presenting the workshop.


-While some volunteers deliver the talks and workshops, other volunteers use that time to support with childcare. These volunteers provide the children with coloring material related to the theme of the day, so that both mothers and little ones have a connection with the theme provided.


-Volunteers also support with mobile clinics, medical clinics, gardens, food bag deliveries, and any other activity that takes place at the time of their visit.

They are also asked to work on a specific issue that they have identified based on the needs of the communities and/or the clinic.

-Interested volunteers also have opportunities to support in creating material and content for our social media, reports and newsletters, grants, international and local fundraising.

Although some projects may seem small, our volunteers are helping to keep the clinic running, therefore keeping healthcare accessible to the people of the Palajunoj Valley.





During 2022, we also had visits from two organizations that always support us by sharing information about our projects and activities with their volunteers.

For the past few years, our program was heavily affected by the pandemic, which reduced our available resources and put the development of our projects in constant danger. Fortunately, thanks to a strong Primeros Pasos team, our recurring donors, and volunteers who were able to participate remotely (and in-person when allowed), we were able to keep our doors open and carry out our projects. Although we were not able to operate our projects at 100% capacity, we were able to meet our goals.

This year we would like to welcome three partnerships that are, in one way or another, related and connected to our values, mission, and vision. We are grateful for the trust and support placed in us and we hope that our partnerships will continue well into the future.

INTERNATIONAL FUNDRAISING

Throughout the year, we ran 4 international fundraising campaigns through our Classy and Facebook platforms. Using our fundraising plan and available electronic resources, we were able to reach more than 2,300 donors who did not hesitate to contribute to our campaigns. We thank them wholeheartedly for their unconditional support.

The campaigns were: Mother's Day in May, our 20th Anniversary in October, Giving Tuesday in November, and Health for the Holidays in December. These campaigns allowed us to raise a total of Q 70,299.39.

LOCAL FUNDRAISING

We held three fundraising events at Kasa Kiwi: the first one on February 14th for Valentine's Day, the second one on July 4th for the Independence Day of the United States, and the third one for Halloween on October 31th. Due to a power outage at Kasa Kiwi on July 4th, we were unable to host the fundraising event, even though we had successfully organized logistics, marketing, and event set-up. These fundraising events allowed us to raise Q1880.00 in total.







COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAM MOTHERS' GRADUATION CEREMONY

At the end of the year, the Nutritional Recovery Program holds a graduation ceremony to thank all the mothers and their children for their participation in the program. We honor their interest in improving the quality of life for them and their families, and recognize the knowledge and helpful practices they learned during all the activities carried out within the program. During this ceremony we also teach our final cooking workshop, and the healthy recipe is then distributed to all the guests. This year, we were joined by 200 mothers, children and pregnant mothers who were beneficiaries of the program in 2022. To close this ceremony, we give them a diploma which certifies them as "Healthy Mothers".





ANNIVERSARY

We celebrated 20 years of service to the 10 communities of the Palajunoj Valley with the visit of our founder, Dr. Brent Savoie. Both the clinic team and the beneficiary mothers were able to thank him for his initiative in the creation of the organization.





ROGER THUROW VISIT


In December, we had a visit from Roger Thurow and his lovely wife Anne, who came to follow-up on the lives and development of the mothers who were involved in the research for his latest book, THE FIRST THOUSAND DAYS: A CRUCIAL MOMENT FOR MOTHERS AND CHILDREN AND THE WORLD. This book was an important part of the 1000 days movement, which is a response to the recent devastating food crises and new research on the economic and social costs of hunger and child stunting. In this inspiring, sometimes heartbreaking book, Roger Thurow takes us inside the lives of rural Quetzaltenango families, as well as families from three other rural areas of the world including Uganda, India and rural Chicago.
